In 24-48 hours after you applied, you will receive a welcome email from SCCCD Admissions & Records with your student ID#. After 48 hours, if you do not receive your student ID#, call FCC Admissions & Records at (559) 443-8604. MY PORTAL AND EMAIL ■ To access your Student Portal & Email, use the login instructions on the next page. ORIENTATION Complete the online orientation. Visit www.scccd.edu/orientation. You will need to know your Student Portal login information to complete this step. Once completed, it may take 1-2 business days to clear your orientation hold. For high school seniors, access the orientation beginning December 1. **ADVISING/ASSESSMENT** ■ Meet with an FCC counselor to select the appropriate level of classes to enroll in and complete your first semester Student Education Plan (SEP-A). Schedule your appointment by visiting www.fresnocitycollege.edu/academics/counseling and choose the student group that applies to you. REGISTRATION Register for classes through Self-Service in your Student Portal. For instructions on how to register, visit www.fresnocitycollege.edu/registration.

# Mext Steps CHECKLIST

Registering for classes is an important step in becoming a student at FCC, but there is still plenty to do after registration to prepare for the beginning of the semester. Here are some things you can do before classes start:

- CHECK YOUR STUDENT EMAIL DAILY
- Your email is the primary method the college uses to send you important information including financial aid, registration eligibility, and deadlines. To access your email, login through the FCC student portal.
- APPLY FOR FINANCIAL AID AND SCHOLARSHIPS

  Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at fafsa.ed.gov or the California Dream Act application at
  - dream.csac.ca.gov. If you need assistance, call the Financial Aid Office at (559) 442-8245 or email financial aid office@fresnocitycollege.edu.

    Additional scholarships and aid may be available, visit fresnocitycollege.edu/financialaid for more information.
- PAY YOUR STUDENT FEES

  Even if your tuition is covered by financial aid, there may be additional costs such as the health or ASB fee. Check the fee amount owed and the deadline in Self-Service or visit fresnocitycollege.edu/fees for more information, including how to submit your payment.
- CHECK YOUR WAITLIST STATUS

  If you are waitlisted for a class during registration, make sure to check your student email daily for a "Permission to Register" message. You will have four days (including weekends) to enroll in the class using Self-Service under the Academics tab, by clicking Register for Classes/View My Schedule link.
- GET YOUR STUDENT ID

  Your student ID has many benefits! Purchase your ID card in the Business Office located in the Old Administration Building (OAB-151) and take your student ID picture in the Student Activities Office (next to the Cafeteria).
- PURCHASE YOUR PARKING PERMIT

  If you need to park on campus, make sure to purchase a parking permit online at www.mycampuspermit.com/fresno-city.html
- PURCHASE YOUR BOOKS AND SUPPLIES

  Visit the Fresno City College Bookstore online through fresnocitycollege.edu/bookstore or on campus across from the cafeteria. You
- SCREEN SHOT YOUR CLASS SCHEDULE

- Your class schedule is available in Self-Service and includes, the class name, date, time, location, and instructor's name. You can find your schedule under the Academics tab by clicking "Register for Classes/View My Schedule" link, then press the "Print" button above your schedule. Print or take a screen shot of your schedule for the first day of class.
- Ram Ready is Fresno City College new student welcome event where you will receive all of the information and services that you need to start your semester. You will be emailed during the summer when sign ups are available. Information can also be found on our website. In the search bar, type "Ram Ready".



Disabled Students Programs and Services staff are committed to creating an accessible learning community where individuals with disabilities have an equal opportunity to pursue their educational goals. We strive to empower students, foster independence, and promote achievement through self-advocacy.

#### Eligibility

- Documentation from an appropriate licensed professional such as a doctor, nurse practitioner, psychiatrist, psychologist, licensed clinical social worker, ophthalmologist, audiologist, licensed speech professional, or neurologist
- Existing documentation from a medical facility or another public or private non-profit agency serving people with disabilities such as Department of Veterans Affairs, Department of Rehabilitation, Independent Living Center, or disability specific agency
- An Individual Education Plan (IEP) that was developed in high school, including any documentation or testing that was used to determine eligibility for the IEP
- A 504 Plan that was developed in high school, along with any medical documentation or testing that was used to determine eligibility
- Personal observation by a certificated DSP&S staff member in conjunction with the student self-report, may verify the existence of an observable disability



# Financial Aid HELPFUL HINTS FAFSA

#### STEP 1

- 1. Visit studentaid.gov/fsa-id to **create your FSA ID**. An FSA ID is the username and password you will use every year to complete and electronically sign your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).
- 2. All contributors will need their own FSA ID to provide required information and sign the FAFSA. (Contributors include parent, other parent, student's spouse, depending on what is applicable.)
- 3. Visit studentaid.gov to **complete your FAFSA**. You may apply as early as October 1 for the following school year. Be sure to add FCC (School code: 001307) to your FAFSA to ensure your application is received.

### **STEP 2 – COMPLETE YOUR FILE**

# Registering FOR CLASSES

**Self-Service** is the system students use to register for classes. 



- ⇒ Click Search.

- ⇒ The status will have a yellow Scheduled bar when it has been added to your schedule. Repeat until all of your classes are added to your schedule. You are now ready to register for your class.



- ⇒ Use the arrow buttons to select the right term.
- □ Check that the class turns green on the Schedule.
   If the class is yellow, you are not registered or may need to press the Waitlist button. If the class is red, it conflicts with another class.







# WAITLISTS and Classes

#### What do I do if I am on the waitlist for a class?

- Check your college email <u>daily</u> for a <u>Permission to Register</u> email. Once permission is granted, you will have four days to enroll in the class. If you have not enrolled before permission expires, you will be removed from the waitlist.
  - If you are on the waitlist when the class starts, you will have priority to add the class following the steps below.

#### How do I add a class after it begins?

- If you would like to add a class after it starts, you will need Add Authorization from the instructor.
- On the first day of class, either attend the class or email the instructor if the class is online. Make sure to include your **student ID number!**
- If there is availability, the instructor will authorize you to add the class. As long
  as you are eligible for the course, you will now have the ability to register by
  adding the section to your Self-Service Schedule and then clicking the
  Register button.



#### Standards of Conduct

**Definitions:** The following conduct shall constitute good cause for discipline, including but not limited to the removal, suspension or expulsion of a student.

- 1. Causing, attempting to cause, or threatening to cause physical injury to another person.
- 2. Possession, sale or otherwise furnishing any firearm, knife, explosive or other dangerous object, including but not limited to any facsimile firearm, knife or explosive, unless, in the case of possession of any object of this type, the student has obtained written permission to possess the item from the Vice President of Student Services or appropriate designee.
- 3. Unlawful possession, use, sale, offer to sell, furnishing, or being under the influence of, any controlled substance listed in California Health and Safety Code Sections 11053 et seq., an alcoholic beverage, or an intoxicant of any kind; or unlawful possession of, or offering, arranging or negotiating the sale of any drug paraphernalia, as defined in California Health and Safety Code Section 11014.5. Marijuana is still federally illegal and therefore the use of recreational or medical marijuana will violate the District's Drug-Free Environment and Drug Prevention Program policy.
- 4. Committing or attempting to commit robbery or extortion.
- 5. Causing or attempting to cause damage to District property or to private property on campus.
- 6. Stealing or attempting to steal District property or private property on campus, or knowingly receiving stolen District property or private property on campus.
- 7. Willful or persistent smoking or vaping in any area where smoking or tobacco use has been prohibited by law or by regulation of the college or the District.
- 8. Persistent, serious misconduct where other means of correction have failed to bring about proper conduct.
- 9. Sexual assault or sexual exploitation regardless of the victim's affiliation with the District.
- 10. Sexual assault, defined as actual or attempted sexual contact with another person without that person's consent, regardless of the victim's affiliation with the community college, including, but not limited to, any of the following:
  - a. Intentional touching of another person's intimate parts without that person's consent or other intentional sexual contact with another person without that person's consent.
  - b. Coercing, forcing, or attempting to coerce or force a person to touch another person's intimate parts without that person's consent.
- 11. Rape, which includes penetration, no matter how slight, without the person's consent, of either of the following:
  - a. The vagina or anus of a person by any body part of another person or by an object.
  - b. The mouth of a person by a sex organ of another person.
- 12. Sexual exploitation, defined as a person taking sexual advantage of another person for the benefit of anyone other than that person without that person's consent, regardless of the victim's affiliation with the community college, including, but not limited to, any of the following:
  - a. Prostituting another person.
  - b. Recording images, including video or photography, or audio of another person's sexual activity, intimate body parts, or nakedness without that person's consent.
  - c. Distributing images, including video or photograph, or audio of another person's sexual activity, intimate body parts, or nakedness, if the individual distributing the images or audio knows or should have known that the person depicted in the images or audio did not consent to the disclosure and objected to the disclosure.

- d. Viewing another person's sexual activity, intimate body parts, or nakedness in a place where that person would have a reasonable expectation of privacy, without that person's consent, and for the purpose of arousing or gratifying sexual desire.
- 13. Committing sexual harassment as defined by law or by District policies and procedures in person or in an online environment and, when the victim or victims are associated with the District, whether or not the location is associated with the District.
- 14. Failure to ensure that he/she/ze has the affirmative consent of the other or others prior to engaging in sexual activity.
- 15. Engaging in harassing, discriminatory, or retaliatory behavior based on disability, gender, gender identity, gender expression, nationality, race or ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation, or any other status protected by law.
- 16. Engaging in abusive conduct or bullying against another individual through words or actions, including direct physical contact; verbal assaults, such as teasing or name-calling; social isolation or manipulation; and cyberbullying.
- 17. Willful misconduct that results in injury or death to a member of the campus community or which results in cutting, defacing, or other injury to any real or personal property owned by the District or on campus.
- 18. Disruptive behavior, willful disobedience, habitual profanity or vulgarity, or the open and persistent defiance of the authority of, or persistent abuse of, college personnel interactions that are face-to-face, e-mail, phone or online.
- 19. Assault, battery, or any threat of force or violence upon a student or college personnel.
- 20. Cheating, plagiarism (including plagiarism in a student publication), or engaging in other academic dishonesty as defined by the College.
- 21. Dishonesty; forgery; alteration or misuse of District documents, records or identification; or knowingly furnishing false information to the District.
- 22. Unauthorized entry upon or use of District facilities.
- 23. Lewd, indecent or obscene conduct or expression on District-owned or controlled property, or at District sponsored or supervised functions.
- 24. Engaging in expression which is obscene, libelous or slanderous, or which so incites others as to create a clear and present danger of the commission of unlawful acts on District premises, or the violation of lawful District regulations, or the substantial disruption of the orderly operation of the District.
- 25. Persistent, serious misconduct where other means of correction have failed to bring about proper conduct.
- 26. Unauthorized preparation, giving, selling, transfer, distribution, or publication, for any commercial purpose, of any contemporaneous recording of an academic presentation in a classroom or equivalent site of instruction, including but not limited to handwritten or typewritten class notes, except as permitted by any District policy or administrative procedure.
- 27. Other behavior or conduct constituting good cause for discipline including, but not limited to, violating District policies, regulations, procedures, and guidelines, disobeying lawful instructions and directions from District personnel, or violating the law.
- 28. Students who engage in any of the above are subject to the procedures outlined in AR 5520 titled Student Discipline Procedures.

#### Requirements for the Associate in Arts and Science Degree

- 1. Sixty (60) units with at least 2.0 (C) grade point average in all courses/units applicable to the associate degree.
- 2. Residence requirements:
  - A. A minimum of twelve (12) degree-applicable semester units in residence at Fresno City College.
- 3. At least eighteen (18) units in a discipline (major) or from related disciplines with a grade of "C" or better in each course. (See the "General Education Requirements for the Associate Degree" for the courses available within these areas):
  - A. Natural Sciences
  - B. Social and Behavioral Sciences
  - C. Humanities
  - D. Language and Rationality: Composition and Analytical Thinking
  - E. Lifetime Wellness: PE and/or Dance and Lifetime Skills
  - F. Government and American Institutions
  - G. Communication
- 4. The demonstration of competence in writing and reading, by completing ENGL 1A or 1AH with a grade of "C" (2.0) or better. The course used to fulfill this requirement may also be used to fulfill Area D.1 of the general education requirement in Language and Rationality: Composition. For further information, see a counselor.
- 5. The demonstration of competence in mathematics by the successful completion of MATH 102, 103, 3A, 4A, 4B, 5A, 5B, 6, 7, 10A, 10B, 11, 17, 21, 26, 42 or 45 with a grade of "C" (2.0) or better. The course used to fulfill this requirement may also be used to fulfill Area D.2 of the general education requirement in Language and Rationality: Analytical Thinking. For further information, see a counselor.
- 6. Students must complete one of the three different general education patterns listed below. General Education Option 1 (FCC GE) is recommended for students who do not intend to transfer. Students intending to transfer to four-year institutions are advised to select Option 2 (CSU GE) or Option 3 (IGETC):
  - A. Option 1 Fresno City College General Education
  - B. Option 2 CSU GE– California State University General Education
  - C. Option 3 IGETC Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum
- 7. Fresno City College shall apply Advanced Placement (AP) credit for those who have scored 3 or higher and College Level Examination Program (CLEP) examinations of a passing score, for credit towards completion of a Fresno City College General Education pattern. For further information, see a counselor.

#### Requirements for the Associate in Arts for Transfer (AA-T) or Associate in Science for Transfer (AS-T)

To earn the Associate in Arts for Transfer (AA-T) or Associate in Science for Transfer (AS-T), students must complete the following: CSU-GE Breath or IGETC requirements, major requirements, and at least sixty (60) semester units with at least 2.0 ("C") grade point average in all courses applicable to the associate degree. Students should consult with a counselor when planning to complete the degree for more information on university admissions and transfer requirements.

#### **Certificate of Achievement**

A Certificate of Achievement shall be awarded to students who successfully complete a specified curriculum with a minimum "C" grade in each required course. The specific courses required for the Certificate of Achievement are identified in each occupational degree curriculum where such certificates are awarded.


